

We pray for those who choose war; that they will remember that you direct your people to turn swords into ploughshares and seek peace.


We pray for leaders on the world stage; that they are inspired by wisdom and the courage of Christ.

This will be at the Methodist Church from 12-noon until 1.30pm on Wednesday 13th April.


There is no set charge but you are invited to make a donation to the Methodist Relief and Development Fund (now known as All We Can) which gives support to those in need at home and abroad.

With planning for the Platinum Jubilee long weekend Bank Holiday in June gaining momentum, it's inevitable that we reflect on the seven-decade reign of Her Majesty – our Queen – and events throughout her 70 years on the throne. For many (not including me, I hasten to add!) those reflections will embrace the time when they met the Queen. And for older folk who met Her Majesty in the early days after her accession, those memories will include recollection of times that were so different...

I grew up in a small village in Kent called Mersham. My parents rented a tiny cottage from Mrs Bendixson, the owner of the adjoining large house. Across the road was an even larger house, more of a mansion – *New House* – the home of Lord and Lady Brabourne.

Lady Brabourne (now Countess Mountbatten) is the Queen's cousin and the then Princess Elizabeth and Prince Philip were occasional visitors to *New House*. I can recall Sundays when the Royal couple were in Mersham when Mum and Dad put on their one set of 'best clothes', dressed me in my school uniform and we all walked to church to line the footpath from the car park to the church door to greet the Royal visitors as they walked from their car to attend the morning service.

Security on such occasions comprised just a uniformed Bobby and a plain-clothes detective from Ashford, our nearest town with a police station. And they based themselves in Mrs Bendixson's kitchen – a full 100 yards from the front door at *New House*! Yes, times were certainly different.

However, not everyone might agree that they were also *better* times.... I often reflect on the more-carefree life that most of us seemed to enjoy in the 1950s, '60s and '70s and regret their passing. But wait a minute;! Have they really passed? My feeling is (and has been for most of the 35 years I've lived in Broadwell) that, to a certain degree, those halcyon days are alive and well and residing within our community...

There are countless examples of kindness, compassion and friendliness that I can cite. It is, in short, a wonderful community in which to live! I thank the Lord for the feelings of security and comfort that gives – and I believe I'm in the company of many in this village and surrounding communities who feel exactly the same.

While I'm sure that if Royalty were to join our Jubilee Picnic on Sunday 5th June their security would be considerably more than a Bobby and a detective from Rugby, life in Broadwell continues to remind me of my wonderful carefree childhood in Mersham — and of the many visits to *New House* that Her Majesty, and other Royals, made.




