

LETTER FROM OUR MINISTER

2 Peter 1:5-7 For this very reason, make every effort to add to your faith goodness; and to goodness, knowledge; and to knowledge, self-control; and to self-control, perseverance; and to perseverance, godliness; and to godliness, mutual affection; and to mutual affection, love.

A few months ago, I had to take my car in for an MoT test. You may know the drill if you are a driver: engine check, brakes check, roadworthy check, tyres check... The period of Lent between Ash Wednesday and Easter could be described as our annual Spiritual MoT. Lent is a time to explore how we are doing spiritually, to examine ourselves and to check our levels of vibrancy and joy, to check our filters are clean (no lingering unforgiveness, cynicism or bitterness) and to check whether we have a renewed sense of the Oil of the Holy Spirit in our lives.

May I stretch the analogy a little further and invite us to perform a quick check of the following four MoT spiritual check points?

1, Personal. Are we personally growing in faith, trust, and intimacy with the Creator? Are we learning what it means to live with God and hear God through His word? (2 Peter 1:5 Make every effort to add to your faith...)

But this alone is not enough. Private prayer and private morality is not enough. And so, we need to also check:

- **2, People.** Are we growing in your trust and intimacy of friendship with others? Are we being drawn deeper into community rather than further isolation? Are we exploring ways to forgive and let go? Are we serving the community? Are we regularly being generous? (2 Peter 1:5 Make every effort to add to your faith goodness, knowledge, self-control...)
- But this is also not enough. You and I can be people of prayer and be open to care for the community, but we can do all of this with hard calloused grumbling religious hearts. We need to discover the right energy; and maintain our warmth of heart. And so, we check our levels of:
- **3, Peace.** Do we have a sense of peace and content in our lives? Do we have peace with what has happened in our lives and with what we worry one day might happen? Are we regularly expressing gratitude and thanksgiving, do we have joy? (2 Peter 1:5 Make every effort to add to your faith...perseverance and godliness...) And, finally, we must check our levels of:
- **4, Purpose.** Are we finding purpose and meaning in what we do and whom we connect with? Are we discovering God at work through us and through our lives. God ushering in His Kingdom values through our lives? (2 Peter 1:5 Make every effort to add to your faith...mutual affection and love).

And the best thing about the Spiritual MoT...? It won't cost you an arm and a leg! **Blessings**,

Elinor Perry sleeps rough on Leamington streets... By Keith Read

But it was all to highlight and support the needs of homeless women who have to spend every night sleeping rough. "Sixty percent of those who are homeless and in temporary accommodation are women," explained Elinor who lives with partner, lan, at Beech House, off The Green. "That statistic is heartbreaking and it's why I am so passionate about supporting The Esther Project."

Elinor recently joined The Esther Project as a steering committee member. The project was founded by Lianne Kirkman, who is spending 10 consecutive sponsored nights sleeping on the streets of towns and cities across the UK to raise awareness about the urgent need for women-only services in tackling homelessness.

"When Lianne told me about the date for her first night – Saturday 1st February – it felt like fate," said Elinor. "It's the day before I celebrate 20 years of owning Pentlands Accountants and Advisors. What better way to mark this milestone by taking on a meaningful challenge?" Which is how she found herself in the cold with no roof over her, raising money through sponsorship for The Esther Project.

"I don't like the cold so I wasn't sure how I would handle it. But that's the point. It's all about stepping into discomfort to make a difference while raising much-needed funds for a cause that's very close to my heart".

Sheila Mary Fennell, 2nd January 1939 – 27th November 2024

The funeral for Sheila Fennell took place at Leamington Hastings Parish Church on Friday 17th January attended by family, friends and neighbours, followed by burial at LH. The service took place three years to the day after the death of her husband, Paul.

Sheila had lived at Fairoaks on The Green, Broadwell since a few months after their marriage in 1968. They had met through their shared passion of flying and were members of rival aero clubs at Baginton Airport, close to where Sheila had been born.

After leaving Kings High School for Girls in Warwick, she joined the Midland Bank in Coventry and rose to become a Senior Cashier, at times working in various branches in Warwickshire.

In 1969 Sheila gave birth to son Andrew who was to spend a lot of his younger life in the back of her Tiger Moth as Sheila pursued her passion for flying and teaching others to fly. As a young learner-pilot she was described by her instructor as '...handling aircraft with the definess and skills that most young ladies handled bicycles!' Over the years Sheila flew a number of aircraft, including a Spitfire. But flying was not her only interest. Sheila loved all creatures feathery and furry, with pigeons her particular fancy. Injured birds, lost homing pigeons or any other animal in distress could be taken to her for compassion, care and – usually – rehabilitation. There didn't seem to be a serious pigeon-fancier in the country that she didn't know. And the same could be said about the country's notable pilots too! With another of her many talents Sheila depicted aircraft, birds, animals and many other subjects in magnificent needlework. Framed artistic creations (often designed by her) won many awards and found homes as much-appreciated gifts among family, friends and neighbours.

For a while Sheila was Secretary of the Broadwell Victory Hall. But for many living in and around LH she was best known as the Clerk to Leamington Hastings Parish Council as well as to Bourton & Frankton Parish Council. And at one stage she was additionally Clerk to the Parish Council at Stretton-on-Dunsmore too!

I first met Sheila not long after moving to Broadwell in 1987 having known of Paul as a Director of Burbages, a thriving Coventry company. Burbages frequently featured in the business pages of the *Coventry Evening Telegraph* where I was, among a number of roles, Aviation Correspondent. Once Sheila knew I was not only interested in aircraft, but had actually learnt to fly at Baginton, I was instantly on her A-list for conversations! As the number of these chats increased it became very clear to me that she had a near-encyclopedic knowledge of a vast range of subjects and was an extremely interesting person with whom to talk.

In a guesture to the aviation world she loved, donations instead of floral tributes to Sheila are going to the Warwickshire & Northamptonshire Air Ambulance.

The Leamington Hastings School Trust

The Learnington Hastings School Trust is open for Financial Grants. The Trust can provide financial assistance to encourage individuals or groups to develop interests and skills. Applicants must fulfil the following conditions:

- 1. Under 25 years of age, resident in Leamington Hastings Parish.
- 2. At school or have been at school in maintained system for at least two years.
- 3. Must be for educational support. This includes social and physical training.
- 4. There is an emphasis on preparation for work in further education.

Grants will be awarded under the following categories:

- A. TO PROVIDE SUPPORT FOR THE YOUNG PEOPLE OF OUR PARISH WHO ARE ON:
 - i) An instruction course
 - ii) A recreational opportunity
 - iii) An educational visit
- B. REMAINDER TO BE USED TO SUPPORT THOSE WHO EXPRESS A DIFFICULTY IN MEETING THE EXPENSES OF THEIR CONTINUING EDUCATION.

Each applicant to be supported by a reference from a Tutor or instructor and a statement of the expenses to be met on the form provided.


