

Dear Rosemary,

Mum and Dad moved to Broadwell when they purchased Orchard Bungalow in 1957 where they remained for the rest of their lives. There was clearly something special about the village and its strong community spirit that kept them there.

Mum was the nurse that everyone turned to, with everything from the usual bumps and grazes to broken bones, serious burn injuries and even life-threatening childbirth-related issues.

As well as advancing his career, Dad was very involved with All Saints, Leamington Hastings and for decades served in roles including Treasurer, Church Warden, Bell Ringer and Lay Reader. He was also on the LH School governing board.

So for over half a century they played a very full part in village and community life. But, importantly, they also received an immense amount of support from the community over that period, in particular when at first Mum, and then later Dad, needed it.

That support came from lots of different people, some known to Sue, Helen and myself, but also some that we have not had the pleasure of meeting during our visits back to the village.

Equally, whilst we know how much Dad enjoyed the regular 'Soup Kitchen' lunches and coffee mornings, we know there were also many small acts of kindness such as delivering his newspaper or just checking that the curtains were being opened and closed each day.

As a token of our appreciation for this support, Sue, Helen and I have decided that we would like to make a donation to one of the most important village institutions and source of the support outlined above, the Broadwell Methodist Chapel.

Therefore, please accept a donation of £1,000 from us to be used towards the current programme of redecoration of the chapel.

ETTER FROM OUR MINISTER

Dear Friends.

It is such a privilege for me to share a little bit of myself and my family as I prepare to serve, worship and witness with you at Broadwell Methodist church.

A little bit about us as a family: We are a family of six. I am married to Lara, a teacher. We have two daughters, Emily (16) and Rachel (13) and two dogs, Hamilton and Drogheda. Our dogs are fondly named after the towns and places I have lived in - so you never know, in the future there just might be a cat or a dog named Broadwell...!

As a family we love building LEGO, eating good meals, playing squash and enjoy playing, listening and making music. We are a close family; we love good coffee, great food, and spending quality time and holidays together.

A little bit about me as an individual: I am Brian Hutton, born in Scotland, moved to South Africa as a young boy, and never went anywhere near a church until I was at least 16 years old when Jesus revealed himself to me in an immensely powerful life-changing way at a Presbyterian church.

I have been a minister and youth pastor (Methodist) for most of my life; entering the ministry in 2006, being ordained in 2011, and leading a church in South Africa for 15 years. During that time God blessed the congregation to grow from a small group of 15 to almost four hundred.

We arrived in England during the COVID pandemic in July 2020 and have been ministering in Darlington, serving four churches for the past four years offering pastoral care and leading all-age, intergenerational services.

While at Darlington we initiated a WAVE service and café that seeks to include and welcome those who have learning difficulties and those who live with symptoms of dementia, offering ministry to them and those who care for them.

I love playing my guitars (yes, you read right - plural!) also mountain biking, reading, staying busy and all matters regarding spiritual formation, discipleship, and church growth.

My deep desire is to work, serve, witness, and share God's grace and love together and grow God's Kingdom in this beautiful area. I am at my happiest when I am able to unpack the wisdom of Scripture and apply it for life and spiritual formation.

Looking forward to meeting you all and setting up visits with countless cups of tea!

Broadwell's second Silver Medalist:

Congratulations to Linda Haynes who became our second Silver Medalist when she and her playing partner got through to the finals of their group in the English Open Pickleball Tournament in Telford.

The event is the third-largest in the world and the largest outside the USA. Some 1,976 competitors from 45 countries took part in the tournament with 1,755 games being played over seven days in 123 individual groups. Entrants ranged from eight to 80 years old and included several professional players who stretched the amateurs to their limit.

Not to be outdone, Bob won two Firsts in the recent village Fower Show – one for the largest onion you've ever seen and one for his sculpture of a canoeist. Having said that, Linda also won a First for her embroidery!

Last month we reported that Toni Senior was Silver Medalist in the grueling Europen Middle-Distance Triathlon Championships in Portugal.

Shoebox Appeal aims for record response!

Broadwell has traditionally supported the annual appeal for filled Shoeboxes for vulneralbe children for many years, *writes Chrissy Read*. This year we're hoping to do as well as possible.

Your shoebox will be given to a vulnerable child through schools, nurseries, hospitals and orphanages overseas. Our aim is that each box is given in relationship with the local community as part of a long-term commitment to these children. Please be part of this ongoing story that really changes lives simply by filling one (or more!) shoeboxes.

Where do the shoeboxes go?

Like in 2023, this year the shoeboxes will be going to Ukraine, Moldova, Georgia, Bosnia and Romania. Teams4US works with n-country partners like the Red Cross to help find shidlers that are most in need.


Otters sighted locally:


